

THE DUBLIN DECLARATION

PROGRESS 2022-23

TRANSLATION AND DISSEMINATION

The Declaration has been translated into 10 European languages; while summary and popular versions have also been developed or are in preparation.

STAKEHOLDER FOLLOW-UP

A number of national, regional and European initiatives led by CSOs, LRGs and lifelong learning platforms have focused on follow-up to the Dublin Declaration as a starting point.

BOOSTING GLOBAL EDUCATION RESEARCH

The Dublin Declaration has provided the basis for the

ANGEL/GENE/UNESCO Conference in June 2023, bringing policy research in Global Education to new levels.

GLOBAL CRITICAL FRIENDS PROCESS FLOURISHING

The Declaration has inspired regional and global initiatives, facilitated by GENE: an Asia-Pacific Network, an African GE Working Group and informed an Ibero-American process, involving 7 Latin American countries developing their own national strategies.





STRENGTHENING NATIONAL POLICY

At least 18 European countries have used the Declaration as an impetus or inspiration for national strategy development, practice mapping, funding transformation, evaluation processes, and provision integration.



REPORTING PROGRESS

The Dublin Declaration is now integrated into the national reporting process to GENE Roundtables; which now include almost all European countries.



INTERNATIONAL POLICY COHERENCE

Continued engagement with international organisations to use the Declaration for strengthening coherence, particularly with the EC (INTPA and DGEAC), UNESCO (aligning the 1974 Recommendation Revision with the Dublin Declaration values, UNECE (coherence between UNECE strategy documents and the Declaration), and OECD (continued liaison regarding their DAC peer reviews coordination).
